Writing a recount

Tim Peake's space mission

In December 2015, Tim Peake began his six month mission to space and became the first British astronaut to visit the International Space Station (ISS). His aim was to repair the Station's power supply and carry out new experiments that could help humans in the future!

Three days after the crew set off, Tim made his first in-flight call back to Earth. He joked how he'd been practising backwards somersaults in zero-gravity; he admitted more practice was needed! Tim also revealed how he'd got used to zero-gravity, although he did feel dizzy and sick for the first 24 hours.

On 4th January, Tim Peake created history by being the first person to announce 'God save the Queen' from space. This was after he had received a very special message from the Queen who had wished him good luck for the mission.

A month into his adventure, Tim performed the first spacewalk of his career. He repaired the Station's power supply together with NASA astronaut Tim Kopra. Tim felt incredibly proud to be wearing the Union Jack on his sleeve while on the spacewalk.

Near the end of his six-month mission, Tim Peake became the first person to run a 'marathon' in space. Tim, who was strapped to the treadmill to stop him floating away, completed the London Marathon in just over three and a half hours - not bad for someone running in zero-gravity!

Considering all that Tim Peake achieved in such testing conditions, his mission to the ISS was an amazing success. Who knows if he will return to space again one day...?

Main event 1 - Blast off

- 15th December – Tim blasted off on the Soyuz rocket
- Lift off from the desert in Kazakhstan with Tim Kopra & Yuri Malenchenko. Waved goodbye by friends and family

Main event 2 – First in-flight call

- 18th Dec – Tim admitted the first 24 hours were tough and that he felt sick
- Joked about practising somersaults in zero-gravity

Main event 3 – Message to Queen

- 4th Jan – Received a message from the Queen before becoming the first Brit to announce, ‘God save the Queen’ in Space

Main event 4 – Spacewalk

- 15th Jan – Became first Brit to complete Spacewalk (to make a repair). Complete with Tim Kopra. TP had Union Jack (British flag) on sleeve of spacesuit

Main event 5 – London marathon

- 24th April – Completed in Space in 3 and a half hours – had London virtually on screen

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A recount of Tim Peake's mission to the ISS

In December 2015, Tim Peake began his six month mission to the ISS (International Space Station). His aim was to carry out experiments in space and to inspire children who could be astronauts of the future.

Tim and his crew blasted into space on the Soyuz rocket on 15th December. They launched from the desert in Kazakhstan and were cheered by a large crowd which included his friends and family. In less than ten minutes, the crew had left the Earth's atmosphere and were in zero-gravity.

Three days after arriving at the ISS, Tim made his first in-flight call to Earth. He admitted that the first 24 hours were tough as being in zero-gravity made him feel sick. After, he joked that had not yet mastered somersaulting in space but that he would continue practising.

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On 4th January, after receiving good wishes from the Queen, Tim returned a message of gratitude to Her Majesty. Feeling very proud, he announced ‘God save the Queen’ and stated that he was the first to do so from space.

A couple of weeks later, Tim became the first Brit to complete a spacewalk – something he found incredibly exciting. Wearing the Union Jack (British flag) on his sleeve, he made a repair with fellow astronaut, Tim Kopra.

Incredibly, on 24th April, Tim Peake completed the London Marathon in the ISS. Completing it in an impressive time of three and a half hours, Tim was strapped to the treadmill to stop him floating away.

Tim Peake’s mission to the ISS was a huge success which inspired many children to learn more about space. Could you be the next Tim Peake?

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
